Northern Ireland GCSE Results 2022

- Results reflect the return to summer examinations for the first time since 2019
- 37% of students received grade A/7 and above
- Outcomes at grade C/4 and above up 7.8 percentage points from 2019
- Adaptations and assessment burden reduced to take account of disruption
- STEM subjects continue to account for over 40% of entries

Today, the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) has published the provisional 2022 results for just under 30,000 GCSE students across Northern Ireland. This is the first-time GCSE students have taken public summer exams in three years, yet in circumstances very different to those of the pre-pandemic years.

The provisional figures released today show that in Northern Ireland 37% of students received a grade A/7 and above, compared to 30.5% when exams were last sat in 2019. Outcomes at grade C/4 and above were received by 90% of students, compared to 82.2%.

To support the transition back to examinations Awarding Organisations introduced a range of measures, as set out by the Education Departments and Examination Regulators. These measures included an optional reduction in the assessment burden and adaptations to mitigate the disruption to teaching and learning. The approach to grading, adopted by all awarding organisations, also took account of the challenges experienced.

To note, data comparisons¹ are made with 2019 as this was the last year of public examinations. This is the approach agreed by England, Wales and Northern Ireland to ensure meaningful comparison of similar assessments. Evaluation of any previous years' results should be approached with caution due to the differing methods of assessments and circumstances.

GCSE

GCSE entries in Northern Ireland this year have decreased slightly from 166,172 in 2021 to 164,413, a 1.1% decrease. The Year 12 school population increased this year by 0.8%.

Those achieving grade C/4 and above increased by 7.8 percentage points to 90%. Grade A/7 increased to 37% up 6.5 percentage points from 2019.

English Language and Mathematics

In GCSE English Language, 88.7% achieved grade C/4 and above, up 8.0 percentage points from 80.7% in 2019. Those achieving the A/7 grade in English increased to 28.7%, up 5.8 percentage points from 2019.

For GCSE Mathematics, 79.8% achieved grade C/4 and above, an increase of 8.5 percentage points from 2019. Grade A/7 also showed an increase up 3.8 percentage points to 29.4%.

Male / female outcomes

Outcomes increased at A/7 for both males and females, by 6.9 percentage points for males and 6.2 percentage points for females. The results show the gap between genders has decreased at grade C/4 and above from 7.1 percentage points in 2019 to 3.7 percentage points this year.

Subject entries

Subject choices continue to be similar to previous years. The overall proportional entries for Languages remains steady from 2021 to 2022.

Over 41% of all GCSE entries taken in Northern Ireland are STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subjects.

9-1 GCSEs

This is the fifth full year of the 9–1 grade scale offered by England based awarding organisations. A small percentage of students in Northern Ireland (3.1%) will receive a 9–1 grade, with the vast majority (96.9%) of students continuing to take A* - G graded GCSEs.

Standards remain anchored at grades A/7, C/4 and G/1. Comparisons across years, subjects and jurisdictions are possible at these anchor points.
