Northern Ireland GCSE Results 2023

- GCSE results reflect the continuing journey to pre-pandemic grading.
- Results are higher than 2019, lower than 2022.
- 86.8% of students received grade C/4 and above.
- 34.5% received grade A/7 and above.

Today, the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) has published the provisional 2023 results for over 30,800 GCSE students across Northern Ireland. This is the second-time students have undertaken summer exams marked and graded by exam boards since 2019.

The overall provisional figures show that grades this year are higher than 2019, but lower than in 2022, reflecting the continued return to pre-pandemic grading.

GCSE

GCSE entries in Northern Ireland have increased slightly to 168,118 from 164,413 in 2022. A 2.3 percentage point increase, in line with the rise in school population this year.

The GCSE results in Northern Ireland show that 86.8% of students received grade C/4 and above, and 34.5% achieved grade A/7 and above.

Girls continue to have higher outcomes at A/7 and above by 10% points, and at C/4 and above by 3.7% points.

English Language & Mathematics

In GCSE English Language, 27.3% of entries achieved A/7 and above, and 86.5% achieved grade C/4 and above.

This year's figures for GCSE Mathematics show that 29.2% of entries achieved A/7 grade and above, whilst 76.4% of entries were awarded a grade C/4 or above.

Subject entries

Subject choices reflect no change in the top five, with 41.6% of all GCSE entries in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subjects. This year, STEM entries rose by 2.5%.

Notes to Editors

9-1 GCSEs

In Northern Ireland, there is an open qualifications market, which means that schools can choose to take GCSEs offered by awarding organisations other than CCEA, which are graded 9 to 1, provided they comply with Department of Education requirements.

A small percentage of students in Northern Ireland (3.3%) will receive a 9–1 grade, with the vast majority (96.7%) of students continuing to take A* - G graded GCSEs.

CCEA Summer 2023

GCSE Provisional results 2023

The statistics below represent the provisional Northern Ireland GCSE results from five JCQ awarding organisations: - AQA, CCEA, OCR, Pearson, WJEC Eduqas.

Comparisons to any previous years' results should be approached with caution due to the differing methods of assessments and circumstances.
