GCSE results show an increase in students awarded top grades

Today, the Joint Council for Qualifications has published the 2025 Wales results for GCSEs, alongside the release of Level 1 and 2 vocational and technical qualifications (VTQs).

Highlights:

- 307,089 total entries down by 3.0% (9,499 entries) compared with 2024
- Overall outcomes show an increase in students awarded top grades
- 19.5% candidates awarded the top grades A*/9 A/7
- Top 10 subjects by entry remains unchanged compared with 2024
- Religious Studies has seen a 12.7% decrease in entries (-1,319)
- French and Spanish have both risen in popularity, with entries up 6.7% (+143) and 17.1% (+232) respectively

This year's results compared with 2024

- A*/9 A/7 up by 0.3 percentage points (pp)
- A*/9 C/4 up by 0.3pp
- A*/9 G/1 up by 0.3pp

GCSE overall performance

The GCSE results for Wales show that 19.5% of candidates have been awarded the top grades A*/9- A/7, whilst 62.5% of candidates have been awarded a C/4 grade or above.

The total number of GCSE examination entries in Wales this year was 307,089, a decrease of 3.0% (9,499 entries) on 2024.

Mathematics

In Wales, students have the opportunity to take either GCSE Mathematics or GCSE Mathematics - Numeracy, with the majority taking the opportunity to study both subjects.

This year's figures show that 13.4% of candidates achieved A*/9 – A/7 grades for GCSE Mathematics, whilst 49.0% of candidates have been awarded a grade C/4 or above.

Meanwhile, 13.6% of candidates achieved $A^*/9 - A/7$ grades for GCSE Mathematics – Numeracy, whilst 52.1% of candidates have been awarded a grade C/4 or above.

For GCSE Mathematics and GCSE Mathematics-Numeracy, entries and outcomes are most appropriately reflected in the best outcome obtained by 16 year olds across both the November and summer series.

English and English Literature

12.2% of all grades awarded to GCSE English Language candidates were A*/9 – A/7 this year, whilst 55.6% of candidates achieved a grade C/4 or above.

For GCSE English Literature, 20.5% of candidates achieved grades A*/9 – A/7, and 72.2% of candidates have been awarded a grade C/4 or above.

Similarly to GCSE Mathematics, for GCSE English and GCSE English Literature, entries and outcomes are most appropriately reflected in the best outcome obtained by 16 year olds across both the November and summer series.

Welsh First Language and Welsh Second Language

13.9% of candidates achieved $A^*/9 - A/7$ grades in GCSE Welsh First Language, whilst 66.3% of candidates have been awarded a grade C/4 or above.

Meanwhile, 22.0% of GCSE Welsh Second Language candidates have achieved A*/9 - A/7 grades, and 63.0% of candidates have been awarded a grade C/4 or above.

Entries and outcomes for GCSE Welsh (1st) Language are most appropriately reflected in the best outcome obtained by 16 year olds across the whole academic year.

Separate sciences and double award

The proportion of candidates achieving $A^*/9 - A/7$ in Biology, Chemistry, and Physics is 41.8%, 42.1% and 44.4%, respectively.

86.7% (Biology), 88.7% (Chemistry), and 90.0% (Physics) have achieved a grade C/4 or above.

For GCSE Science Double Award, 7.5% of candidates have been awarded $A^*/9 - A/7$ grades, and 50.0% of candidates have achieved a grade C/4 or above.

The Double Award qualification and the separate science qualifications are of the same academic standard, however, the separate science subjects continue to attract the highest proportion of the most able students.

Jill Duffy, Chair of JCQ Board of Directors and Chief Executive of OCR, said:

"Looking at these results, it is hard not to be impressed by students' breadth of skills and knowledge.

What I find most exciting about results day is seeing the diverse range of qualifications achieved, from maths to art to hospitality – and what that means to hundreds of thousands of young people. The subjects may be very different, but every single qualification issued today is a passport to future success and opportunities.

These students have shown resilience and determination throughout their school years; they now have the chance to thrive in their next endeavours, whether that is in education, training or apprenticeships. Congratulations to you all on what you have achieved today."

Data Analysis

• There is a small number of candidates, mainly from the independent sector, who sit the reformed GCSE 9-1 examinations. Their overall outcomes are included in the headline figures, however, their outcomes are not included in the subject analysis which is A* - G only.
